 - A. When I was first an attorney I was appointed as a public defender for a defendant charged with the unlawful sale of dangerous drugs. On the eve of trial, I was presented with evidence that showed my client had altered time records attempting to establish an alibi. This thrusted me into the conflict between representing my client and preventing fraud on the Court. While jurors were waiting in the hallway to begin jury selection, I reminded the Court that it had not ruled on my Motion for Speedy Trial. It was granted and my angst receded, but it is burned into my memory.
 - B. A single engine aircraft with the pilot and a passenger crashed into the east side of the Swan Range killing them both. The pilot, who had flown for Frontier, was very experienced and careful. It just didn't make sense. We filed our case in Federal Court and argued that the altimeter had stuck misleading the pilot. This involved a great deal of complex and challenging research and thinking.
 - C. A husband and wife placed their lake property in an irrevocable trust. Despite their subsequent death and a directive that the trust be distributed to their children, that never occurred. Many years elapsed and all but one of the children also died. Finally, some of those who remained filed a lawsuit to partition or force a sale of the property. I was appointed by the Court as Successor Trustee and worked through numerous conflicting personalities, complex income tax issues, shared well and

access disputes with the neighbor, and finally a sale of the property and division of the proceeds.

The above cause came before the Court because of the murder of Rozalyn Blumel, A.L.U.'s mother, an act committed by the Respondents' son, Tyler Urich, A.L.U.'s father. The Respondents, hereinafter "Uhrichs", the paternal grandparents of A.L.U., became the child's adoptive parents, and thereupon halted all visitation between A.L.U. and her maternal grandmother, the Petitioner, hereinafter "Sharline". This case is not one that questions the fitness of the Uhrichs as parents. The Court finds that ample evidence supports that the Uhrichs are fit as parents. However, this case is about respecting the constitutional rights of A.L.U., as a child, to maintain contact via limited visitation with her maternal grandmother following the murder of the child's mother by the child's father, son of her adoptive parents.

On June 28, 2024, the Court held a hearing on a Petition for Grandparent Visitation. Sharline appeared personally and with her attorney, Kevin Ness. The Uhrichs, appeared personally and with their attorney, Casey L. Emerson.

At the hearing in this matter, witnesses were sworn and testified, and exhibits were introduced.

After considering all evidence and pleadings, the Court enters the following:

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Sharline is the maternal grandparent of A.L.U.
- 2. The Uhrichs are the paternal grandparents and adopted parents of A.L.U., a minor child. A.L.U is four years old.
- In 2018, Rozlyn Bluemel, Sharline's daughter, and Tyler Uhrich, the Uhrich's son, began dating. A.L.U. was born on March 14, 2020, out of Rozlyn and Tyler's relationship.
- 4. On May 10, 2022, Tyler murdered Rozlyn. Tyler pled guilty to deliberate homicide in October 2022. In February 2023, he was sentenced to 80 years in the Montana State Prison. Following his guilty plea, Tyler's parental rights were terminated.
- 5. Prior to Rozlyn's death, Sharline had frequent contact with A.L.U. Rozlyn would bring A.L.U. to Sharlene's house in Ronan, Montana on a regular basis. Sharline's other two daughters, Madison Bluemel and Elizabeth Bluemel, Rozlyn's sisters, would usually be present for these visits. From all accounts the visits were age appropriate, fun, and fostered a loving and caring environment for A.L.U.
- Subsequent to Rozlyn's death and Tyler's incarceration, the State filed a Dependent Neglect action involving A.L.U. The case was filed in Lake County District Court under Cause No. DN-24-2022-1.

- 7. During the pendency of the Dependent Neglect matter, A.L.U. remained in the care and custody of the Uhrichs. Child and Family Services facilitated unsupervised visitations between A.L.U. and Sharline, where Sharline and her daughter Madison engaged the child in age-appropriate play and provided A.L.U.'s physical needs by feeding her when needed, providing clothing and toys, and sharing love and affection.
- 8. The Permanency Plan for A.L.U. was adoption. In June 2023, Uhrichs filed a Petition for Adoption in the Montana Twentieth Judicial District Court, Lake County, Cause No. DA-23-04. The adoption was finalized on June 15, 2023. Notice of the adoption proceeding was not provided to Sharline and no such notice is required by law.
- After the adoption was finalized, the Uhrichs immediately terminated Sharline's visitation. Sharline has not seen A.L.U since June 2023.
- 10. Petitioner filed the above cause on June, 21, 2023. Petitioner wants a regular visitation schedule with A.L.U.
- 11. There are no allegations the Uhrichs are unfit parents to A.L.U. Sharline acknowledges she agreed to the Uhrichs as A.L.U.'s guardians and that they are best suited to be her adoptive parents. The Court finds that the Uhrichs are fit parents.
- 12. The Uhrichs object to any contact between A.L.U. and Sharline. The basis for said objection is that the Uhrichs allege A.L.U. experienced adverse health reactions when forced to visit Sharline, that Sharline has a chemical dependency issue, that Sharline has had a history with CFS, and that Rozlyn expressed a desire to others that she did not want A.L.U. to have a relationship with Sharline.
- 13. No medical evidence was presented at the hearing to support the claim that A.L.U.'s gastrointestinal issues were related to contact with Sharline. No evidence was

provided that Sharline currently uses drugs or used drugs during visits with A.L.U.

- 14. The Court does take note of Sharline's past drug and alcohol use.
- 15. The Court finds that preventing Sharline from having a relationship with A.L.U. is not in A.L.U.'s best interests. Where her mother was murdered by her adoptive parents' son, her father now her stepbrother, it is important for A.L.U.'s well-being to preserve a connection with her maternal grandmother.
- 16. Much of the testimony presented was unreliable hearsay, irrelevant as to alleged conduct many years in the past, and based on obvious personal grudges that should not be the basis to deny A.L.U. her constitutional right to visitation with her maternal grandmother, Sharline, under the extraordinary facts of this case.
- 17. The Guardian Ad Litem, Marybeth M. Sampsel, appointed in this matter, in her Confidential Report dated April 24, 2024 on file herein at page 17 found "...that some minimal contact is likely in the child's best interest..." And also stated on page 17, "Given the circumstances under which Rozlyn died, contact with maternal relatives is one of the best ways [A.L.U.] can maintain some understanding of who her mother was, what she was like, the things they have in common, and so forth." Based on the testimony, the Court agrees.

From the foregoing Findings, the Court draws the following conclusions:

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 1. That the Court has jurisdiction over this cause.
- 2. The Court determines there is clear and convincing evidence that some visitation between A.L.U. and her maternal grandmother Sharline under the circumstances of this case is in A.L.U.'s best interests and rebuts the presumption in favor of following

the desires of the adoptive parents, the Uhrichs.

- 3. The Montana State Legislature recognizes "the Montana Constitution affords a child the same fundamental rights as a parent, including, at a minimum, the inalienable right to a clean and healthful environment, the right to pursue life's basic necessities, the right to enjoy a safe, healthy, and happy life, and the right to basic human dignity as provided in Article II, sections 3, 4, and 15, of the Montana Constitution, and that in appropriate circumstances, a parent's rights should yield to the child's…" 2019 Mt. ALS 199, 2019 Mt. Laws 199, 2019 Mt. Ch. 199, 2019 Mt. HB 347. The Court determines that the facts of this case are such circumstances and further determines that said Constitutional right extends beyond the statutory provisions provided by the legislature, as the facts of this case could not have been contemplated.
- 4. The Court is not substituting its judgment for the judgment of the adoptive parents, but rather is enforcing the constitutional rights of a child whose mother was murdered under the unusual circumstances of this case.
- 5. That in recognition of the Uhrichs' constitutional rights as parents, Sharlene's visitation should be limited and supervised.

From the forgoing Findings and Conclusions, the Court enters the following:

<u>ORDER</u>

It is HEREBY ORDERED that Petitioner's Petition for Grandparent Visitation is HEREBY GRANTED in part. The Court orders the parties to abide by the following Visitation Plan:

 Sharline's visitation with A.L.U. is restricted to supervised visitation. It is up to the Uhrichs if they choose in the future to allow Sharline increased supervised visitations and/or to have unsupervised visits.

- 2. Sharline shall have the option of exercising supervised visitation time with A.L.U. once every two months on a mutually agreed upon date beginning September 2024 for a period of up to four hours at an agreed upon location/provider and at her expense.
- 3. The parties may elect to use a neutral third party for communication in arrangements for visitation. If the parties cannot mutually agree on a third party, then the parties shall sign up and use Our Family Wizard (https://www.ourfamilywizard.com/) for communication for visitation.
- 4. The parties shall notify each other in writing of any change in residence, telephone numbers, or other relevant contact information.
- 5. The parties shall promote a healthy and beneficial relationship between the child and both parties and will not demean or speak out negatively in any manner that would damage the natural flow of love, affection, and caring between the parties and the child. Furthermore, the parties shall refrain from and shall discourage third parties from speaking negatively about the other parties in front of the child. The parties shall encourage only positive or neutral comments in front of the child by third parties, including other family members.
- 6. This limited Grandparent- Grandchild Visitation Plan is in the child's best interests and respects the adoptive parents' parental rights.
